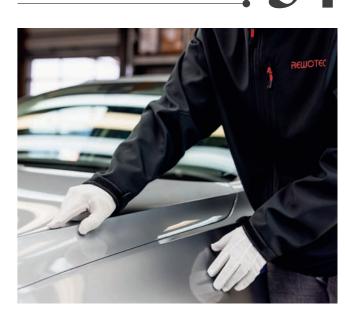

## FROM BRAKE



## TO THE WORLD

What began in 1988 with a handful of dedicated and visionary employees in a modest wooden hut in Brake (Unterweser) has grown into a globally operating logistics service provider with more than 4,600 employees, a proprietary fleet of over 2,100 trucks, and a comprehensive network spanning more than 22 countries. The history of the L.I.T. Group is not only a remarkable story of entrepreneurial success; it also serves as a reflection of the economic and societal developments that have shaped the past decades.

he L.I.T. Group was founded in 1988 during a period of profound political transformation and change – just before the fall of the Iron Curtain and the opening between East and West Germany. Originally established as a traditional trucking company, the business initially consisted of L.I.T. Speditions GmbH and another fleet company, the predecessor of today's L.I.T. Cargo GmbH. "We started out in a wooden hut, with only a handful of colleagues but with great drive and an extraordinary level of commitment to building and expanding L.I.T. as a company, "recalls Fokke Fels, one of the three founders and today the sole owner of the L.I.T. Group.

The pioneering spirit of those early years – characterized by hands-on work, solidarity, and a down-to-earth mentality – continues to shape the company culture to this day.

#### **Growth Despite Crises**

With the beginning of the new millennium, the global economy faced multiple profound and far-reaching challenges. In particular, the global financial and economic crisis of 2008 severely affected large parts of the logistics sector. The L.I.T. Group responded with entrepreneurial foresight and strategically realigned its overall approach: to better mitigate crisis-related risks, the company placed greater emphasis on industry and service diversification, in particular through the targeted expansion of long-term business relationships outside the automotive sector.

In parallel, the structure and composition of the company's own fleet was thoroughly re-evaluated: a more flexible and optimized mix of proprietary equipment, increased use of independent con-



drive and an extraordinary level of commitment!«

tractors and specialized service providers, and the expansion of trailer transport operations enhanced adaptability and efficiency in operational activities, creating the solid foundation for the L.I.T. Group's continued success today.

#### **Shaping Globalization Actively**

With the acquisition of Compass Logistic International AG and the associated development and expansion of L.I.T. Air & Sea GmbH in 2018, the corporate group took a decisive strategic step. Entry into the international air and sea freight market not only expanded the range of services but also extended the geographical reach of the previously regional logistics provider, from Europe to the rest of the world.

Simeon Breuer, Board Member of the L.I.T. Group

Simeon Breuer, board member responsible for transport logistics, explains: »Over decades, we have not only evolved but have become a globally operating logistics provider.« A prime example of this strategic development is the establishment of several offices in India, which are primarily responsible for coordinating operations across the Asian transport and logistics market.

#### **Consolidation and Acquisitions**

The development into a global logistics provider also extends to contract logistics. Through the acquisition of the Hölkemeier Group in 2019, warehouse capacity was increased by more than 150,000 square meters and prominent customers from the consumer goods sector were added. At the Minden site, the completion of the RegioPort in 2025 created a facility that is a rarity in Germany: a 40,000-square-meter hall, of which 18,000 square meters can self-regulate its climate, providing ideal conditions for fresh logistics operations. The company's own infrastructure has been consistently expanded over the years: L.I.T. currently operates approximately 1,000,000 square meters of warehouse space, 2,160 trucks, 5,650 swap bodies, and 2,100 semi-trailers – a remarkable development compared to the modest fleet of the early years.

#### **Digitalization and Sustainability**

In addition to operational growth, the Group also pursues strategic initiatives such as digitalization and climate protection. Recent projects confirm this forward-looking direction: the introduction of electric trucks for shuttle services, the opening of new logistics centers with a focus on energy efficiency, and the establishment of L.I.T. Speed GmbH, a specialized company for time-critical logistics processes.

With the acquisition of dataform dialogservices GmbH in August 2025, L.I.T. further expanded its service portfolio in the areas of fulfillment, print and output solutions for e-commerce, and dialog marketing – a clear signal of commitment to a digital future.

#### People at the Center

Despite its size, the L.I.T. Group has preserved a family-oriented spirit. Simeon Breuer, who is with the company since his apprenticeship in 1992, summarizes it succinctly: »It is the people and their dedication across all areas – whether in the fleet, logistics, transport, or warehouse – that form the foundation and secure the future.« This is reflected in a strong core of L.I.T. employees, who, like Breuer, have been with the company since the beginning, occupy key positions, and continue to hold them today. It is also evident in the career paths of the board members: Not only Simeon Breuer, but also Ingo Schreiber and Julian Lachnitt all began as young professionals and, since 2020, alongside Fokke Fels, have taken on leadership roles within the company.

#### A Look Ahead

Today, the L.I.T. Group stands as a global full-service logistics provider on a stable foundation – both economically and culturally. With consistent depth of services, technological innovation, and a corporate culture that combines reliability with openness, the Group is well prepared to meet future challenges.

The story of the L.I.T. Group is far from complete. One thing is certain: it will continue to be guided with vision, responsibility, and dedication.

# CONNECTING INDUSTRIES, UNLOCKING POTENTIAL.

The L.I.T. Group operates in 2025 within a challenging market environment. Volatile demand, a shortage of drivers, as well as new opportunities arising from digitalization and international expansion, shape the business landscape. In this context, board members Fokke Fels, Simeon Breuer, Julian Lachnitt, and Ingo Schreiber explain how networked structures and strategic partnerships form the foundation for sustainable growth.

he year 2025 has so far been characterized by a tense overall economic environment – a year full of challenges for many industries. The logistics sector is also feeling the impact, whether through fluctuating demand, rising costs, or structural bottlenecks. Against this backdrop, what is the current market situation for the L.I.T. Group?

**FOKKE FELS** In this environment, 2025 presents significant challenges. We are experiencing extreme volatility – from calm periods to genuine surges in demand and back again. Specifically, we see a quiet first quarter, followed by a »wild« second quarter, another period of calm in the third quarter, and likely an intense fourth quarter. These fluctuations underscore the need for the Group to operate in a highly networked manner and to intelligently orchestrate our various business divisions.

SIMEON BREUER The high level of dynamism was particularly noticeable during the short holiday weeks in spring and summer. During this period, we reached our capacity limits, as there was very little additional cargo space available on the market. Therefore, we must act counter-cyclically – building capacity early in order to be able to respond during peak periods. The challenge lies in ensuring that this approach remains economically viable.

How does the L.I.T. Group address these challenges in driver and fleet management, particularly in light of structural labor shortages?

**INGO SCHREIBER** The shortage of drivers continues to be a significant challenge for our operations. We also observe that the issue is becoming structurally more severe: during quieter market periods, many drivers leave the industry to pursue employment

in other sectors. Once these professionals depart, they are often no longer available in the long term, which further reduces overall cargo capacity in the market and increases competitive pressure.

We have recognized that the solution to this challenge goes beyond simply offering higher wages. It requires the creation of a comprehensive network of touchpoints and support services for our drivers. Our driver hubs at the locations of Brake, Bremen, Wolfsburg, Kassel, and Koblenz are much more than parking facilities – they serve as community hubs equipped with kitchens, laundry facilities, and sleeping quarters. This infrastructure not only enhances driver retention but also strengthens our ability to attract and integrate new talent, ensuring operational continuity and maintaining high service standards even in a tight labor market.

How does this networking work in other areas – for example, in terms of collaboration between the different companies within the Group?

**FELS** This is one of our greatest success factors as a corporate group. When a contract logistics customer also requires transport services, the respective division steps in. And when specialized personnel are needed for logistics centers, the HR logistics team provides support. These types of connections are created on a daily basis and serve to strengthen the Group as a whole.

BREUER During acquisitions and the establishment of new companies, this becomes particularly evident. Synergies only emerge through an understanding of the respective business. Transparency achieved through volume flow analyses and process harmonization is key. Many of our companies have developed their own structures and processes over decades that work well independently but do not align with our current standard for an integrated, networked L.I.T. system.

Internationalization is a key growth driver for many companies. How does the L.I.T. Group approach this – do you rely on partners or establish your own structures?

**JULIAN LACHNITT** It depends on the specific market. First, we assess whether reliable local partners are available and whether the existing business volume is sustainable. In addition, we always evaluate which solution is faster and better suited to the respective situation.

BREUER Our business is a people-driven business. When a suitable and reliable partner is not available, we need local entrepreneurs who are willing to operate within the L.I.T. Group's processes. The existing volume is also critical: establishing our own structures makes sense primarily in markets where we already manage significant flow volumes and where moving away from agents provides a genuine added value. Markets without relevant traffic flows are therefore currently not considered. Each decision is ultimately made on a case-by-case basis.

What role does digitalization play in the integration of new companies into the Group?

LACHNITT Digitalization is our network enabler. We have already implemented an AI-based solution that automatically converts unstructured incoming documents into transport orders. While this may sound technical, the underlying objective is to ensure that all locations operate with the same streamlined and efficient processes

BREUER In the transport sector, leverage a range of targeted digital tools. Through NeoCargo, cargo searches are now largely automated, saving time and increasing productivity. Additionally, our new Data Warehouse provides full transparency during acquisitions without immediately requiring new companies to migrate to a different TMS. This facilitates smoother integration and allows us to remain flexible.

Networks are composed not only of locations and processes, but above all of the people behind them. How important are employees as part of the company's network?

**FELS** Finding and connecting the right people is at the heart of our company's mission. Recruiting today goes far beyond simply attracting new drivers – skilled professionals in other areas, such as dispatch, administration, or warehouse operations, are also increasingly difficult to find. Traditional training and development alone are no longer sufficient, which is why we are creating new and innovative programs. These initiatives provide career perspectives, enhance employee retention, and ensure that we meet our long-term demand for skilled personnel.

Equally important is providing employees with enough freedom to take initiative. Those who want to make an impact find a platform at L.I.T. – whether through formal training, new opportunities within the Group, or independent projects. L.I.T. thrives on the fact that people bring forward their ideas and assume responsibility, which is central to our culture and long-term success.

Sustainability is becoming an increasingly strategic factor for companies – not only from an ecological perspective but also from an economic responsibility standpoint. What role does this play in your network strategy?

BREUER Sustainability only works in an integrated approach – ecology and economy must go hand in hand. Our goal is to reduce our CO<sub>2</sub> footprint while continuing to grow. To achieve this, we rely on an intelligent and intermodal network. We have recently expanded it further, for example with new connections to Scandinavia. Long-distance transport is deliberately shifted to rail and ferry, while trucks are primarily used for first- and last-mile operations. This way, we combine economic efficiency with ecological responsibility.

**SCHREIBER** Our first electric trucks are already in operation, for example on the Brake – Bremen route. Drivers have responded very positively. However, infrastructure remains a bottleneck: electric trucks are ideal for regional operations, but charging infrastructure is still lacking for long-haul routes. Hydrogen technology remains a promising alternative, though it is not yet widely accessible. The key point is that there is no single solution – we combine multiple approaches and adjust them for each business case in collaboration with our customers and partners.

In light of dynamic market conditions and the increasing complexity of logistics, where is the L.I.T. Group heading strategically, and where do you see the company in the coming years?

BREUER The market will remain volatile. That is precisely why our networked structures are so valuable. I see growth primarily in Europe, for example in France, and internationally in the United States, where we are currently launching our first contract logistics projects. As has already been mentioned, logistics remains a people-driven business. Digitalization and AI will make our processes more transparent and efficient, but ultima-

tely, we always need employees to maintain customer contact and nurture relationships. The critical factor is ensuring that our IT, process, and personnel structures can keep pace with growth. We do not think in rigid revenue targets, but in terms of the capacity of each unit within our Group. This approach allows us to remain flexible and achieve sustainable growth even in a volatile market.

FELS The future lies in the intelligent integration of our business divisions. When HR and contract logistics, transport, and fleet management function seamlessly together, we can deliver innovative and unique solutions that no competitor can easily replicate. This integration is at the very core of our DNA: not pursuing growth for its own sake, but leveraging intelligent networking. Internal networks between colleagues, external networks with customers and partners, and international networks opening access to new markets – all of these elements strengthen resilience, enhance efficiency, and ultimately support continuous, scalable, and sustainable growth across the Group.

For Julian Lachnitt, Managing Director of L.I.T. Lager & Logistik Holding GmbH and Board Member of the L.I.T. Group, digitalization is a key factor for achieving efficient processes within the company.

ith a clear message and an open concept, the L.I.T. Group presented itself from June 2 to 5, 2025, at the world's leading trade fair for logistics, mobility, IT, and supply chain management. The joint appearance of all business divisions highlights a trend increasingly evident in the industry: logistics is no longer a single-discipline activity, but a collaboration of specialized competencies – bundled in the so-called House-of-Brands model, exemplified by the L.I.T. Group.

#### A Debut That Makes an Impact

Around 80 professionals from all areas of the Group – from freight forwarding to express courier services, from warehousing to distribution – were on site in Munich. »Our goal was to show who we are and what we deliver: a full-service logistics provider with genuine customer proximity, practical versatility, and tangible synergies,« explains Simeon Breuer, Managing Director of L.I.T. Speditions GmbH and Board Member of the Group. This goal was clearly achieved, as demonstrated

not only by numerous expert discussions but also by tangible results: a multitude of new contacts, exciting project initiations, and initial agreements, for example in the field of value-added goods logistics with subsequent Europe-wide distribution.

#### Strength Lies in the Network

At the center of attention was the L.I.T. Group's comprehensive and modular service portfolio. This portfolio spans multimodal transport solutions, just-in-time services, and bespoke warehouse concepts, reflecting the Group's commitment to flexibility and innovation. Particularly in demand were rapid, adaptable, and holistic solutions – precisely the offerings of the subsidiaries L.I.T. Speed GmbH and L.I.T. Compact Courier GmbH. Their expertise in emergency logistics, procurement, and express courier services directly addressed the evolving needs of the professional audience, showcasing how integrated capabilities can create real competitive advantage.

#### Three key topics were particularly in focus:

- Comprehensive logistics services meeting customer demand for smart, end-to-end solutions.
- 2. Structural capacity constraints and how they can be addressed through intelligent network utilization.
- **3.** Integrated networking the strength of the House-of-Brands model with its many specialized brands.

»It is precisely our internal diversity within the Group that proves to be a real added value,« says Breuer. »It allows us to respond flexibly to individual customer requirements while simultaneously developing innovative solutions – often faster than the market itself.«

#### A Fresh Start with Tailwind

Even internally, the trade fair made a notable impact. The joint presentation strengthened collaboration among the Group's various units and fostered dialogue across departmental boundaries. The L.I.T. Group now uses the event as an impetus to further deepen internal cooperation and to develop customer solutions more consistently from within its network.

»There is nothing good unless you do it,« Breuer concludes, quoting a well-known proverb. He refers not only to the exceptional trade fair presence itself, but also to the subsequent actions stemming from the discussions: new customer relationships are to be nurtured, project ideas translated into concrete processes, and synergies actively designed and expanded.

#### A Signal for the Industry

The L.I.T. Group's appearance at Transport Logistic 2025 in Munich clearly demonstrated that the company is more than a service provider. It is a shaper of the industry, a globally relevant player distinguished by proximity, competence, and a structured, networked approach. The strong response at the trade fair highlighted the market's urgent demand for partnership-based and fully integrated logistics solutions as well as its readiness to explore new and innovative operational models.

Thus, the circle closes where it began: amid an industry in constant transformation, the L.I.T. Group sends a clear signal – for customer focus, for collaboration, and for a new understanding of logistics.







# A NEW CHAPTER IN NORTH AMERICA

The L.I.T. Group has reached another milestone in its international growth strategy. Together with its long-standing partner, Palfinger AG, the company opened a state-of-the-art spare parts logistics center on October 1, 2025, in Huntley, Illinois, near Chicago. The location marks the Group's official entry into the North American market – and was completed in record time.

he foundation for the project was laid at the end of October 2024 during the official opening of the Palfinger Hub in Bremen. Representatives from Palfinger North America were present and expressed strong interest in establishing a comparable site in the United States. Within a few weeks, initial discussions had evolved into a concrete project plan. By December, it was confirmed: L.I.T. would become the strategic partner for the development of the new Distribution Center. Strategic oversight was provided by Thimo Schulz, CEO of L.I.T. Global Logistics Inc., who traveled shortly thereafter to Canada to set the first course alongside an interdisciplinary project team. Just seven months after project commencement, the logistics center became fully operational. During this period, not only was the facility selected and developed, but a cutting-edge AutoStore system, complete with shelving units, was integrated. All warehouse and office layouts were meticulously designed by L.I.T. and provided as blueprints for local architects and construction teams, ensuring alignment with operational best practices.

#### **Central Hub for North America**

The new Huntley hub consolidates four existing Palfinger locations across the U.S. and Canada. In the future, the facility will store and distribute up to 60,000 spare parts, serving as a key logistical backbone for the region. As the exclusive logistics partner, L.I.T. is responsible for all processes: transportation, storage, order picking, and shipping. The core of the facility is an AutoStore robotic system that automates workflows and is complemented by digital track-and-trace solutions as well as real-time inventory management. This combination of technology and process design aims to significantly accelerate spare parts delivery across North America and minimize machine and vehicle downtime, ensuring maximum operational uptime for Palfinger customers.

#### **Complex Project Under Pressure**

Establishing the Huntley site presented the team with extraordinary challenges. There was no preexisting infrastructure, and all operational, HR, and IT processes had to be developed from the ground up. Within a few weeks, a U.S. entity was founded with headquarters in New York City. Simultaneously, recruiting, contract negotiations, site planning, and logistical fine-tuning with partners and authorities were underway.

Operational project management was led by Rico von Hollen and Tammo Lübben, who ensured that all sub-project leaders were aligned and that am-

bitious timelines were strictly adhered to. Significant contributions were made by Saskia Kerbstadt, Anna Sahin, and Jens Jackson, who ensured a smooth start-up phase and addressed unforeseen operational challenges in real time. Personnel recruitment was overseen by Conny Bienen from Bremen, while the strategic appointment of Jeremy Beck as U.S. Site Manager in August provided crucial on-site leadership and continuity for the local team.

In spring 2025, the rollout began. Within six days, over 1,000 items were relocated from the first location in Oklahoma City to Huntley. The warehouse was initially empty, requiring even social and staff areas to be planned and built to German standards. The arrival of IT hardware from Germany established the foundation for operational readiness, while Thomas Rey from ComLogis GmbH ensured that all technical systems were fully functional in record time.

#### **Precision in Scheduling**

During the summer, installation of the AutoStore system commenced. In less than four weeks, the system was installed, tested, and made fully operational. Shortly before the official opening, more than 12,000 bins were manually stored to ensure full operational capacity from day one. Process management was led by Faruk Demiral and Sebastian Otoo, who had successfully managed the Palfinger project in Bremen.

The go-live took place on September 17, 2025, accompanied by a ceremonial opening with over 250 guests, including representatives from Palfinger management and the L.I.T. leadership, such as Chairman Fokke Fels, Board Member Julian Lachnitt, and CEO Thimo Schulz.

#### **Strategic Expansion of the Partnership**

More than \$20 million was invested in the Huntley project, with financial support provided by Deutsche Leasing AG and Nord/LB, underscoring the confidence of strategic partners in the venture. The successful launch not only validates the long-standing partnership between L.I.T. and Palfinger, in place since 2021, but also positions the facility as a key node for future growth. Once fully operational, the Huntley site is expected to employ

approximately 50 staff members by early 2026, including warehouse specialists, operational managers, IT experts, and administrative personnel, all working in tightly integrated teams.

»Our new multi-user site in Huntley also allows other customers to access the full service portfolio of the L.I.T. Group,« emphasizes Rico von Hollen, COO and Head of Global Business Development at L.I.T. Global Logistics Inc., highlighting the scalability of the Group's processes. Thimo Schulz, President and CEO, describes the project as a milestone: »We have demonstrated that we can perform internationally even under the most challenging conditions. Huntley exemplifies speed, precision, and L.I.T. spirit. The site strengthens our presence in a strategically critical market and proves that we can execute complex projects both quickly and reliably.«

For Palfinger, the Huntley hub represents a cornerstone of its North American growth strategy. By 2030, the crane and lifting solutions provider aims to increase its regional revenue to over one billion dollars. L.I.T. not only provides the logistical foundation but also showcases its own ability to deliver comprehensive contract logistics solutions from a single source.



#### **Intermodal and Sustainable Approach**

In its first year of operations, the focus was on establishing a reliable network for ISO tank transports across the Iberian Peninsula and beyond. Container logistics now complements this offering, allowing for a broader range of customer solutions and improved operational flexibility. A key priority is intermodal transport – combining different modes of transport whenever possible. Whether by truck, rail, or short-sea shipping, the most sustainable and cost-efficient solution is always selected for the customer. Typical routes such as Valencia–Madrid, Antwerp–Barcelona, or Algeciras–Valencia demonstrate the versatility and scalability of the network. Transported goods include bourbon, olive oil, wine, polyolefins, and other petrochemical and food-grade products loaded in ISO tanks and shipped internationally, ensuring both safety and traceability.

#### **Economic Goals with Foresight**

Current conditions, as in many industries, are challenging. 
»The global economy presents constant challenges. Events such as geopolitical tensions, U.S. tariffs, or strikes have direct impacts on our customers – and thus on us,« says Oscar Verdu, describing the daily market challenges that he and his team have successfully navigated. Despite these external pressures, the Tarragona team has already reached its first milestone: »In our first year, we reached the break-even point. Our focus now is on sustainable growth, expanding our service offerings, and strengthening international customer relationships,« Verdu explains, outlining the strategic vision and next objectives.

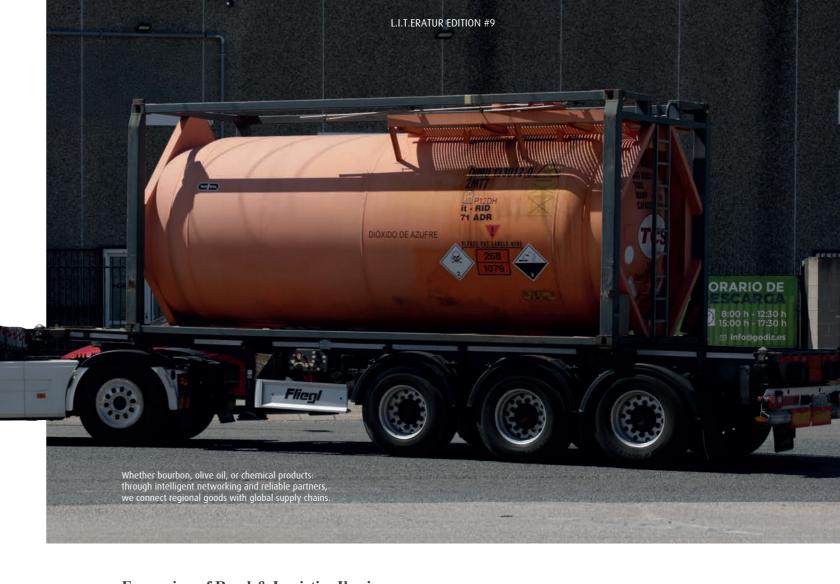
Part of this strategy is enhancing collaboration with other L.I.T. locations. »We aim to expand our container logistics capacities and integrate intermodal transports as a central part of our operations. Shipments from India to Barcelona via sea and then by rail are already being coordinated, and similar models are planned with our hubs in Turkey and other key markets. Regular communication and joint planning between branches ensures seamless execution, reduces transit times, and maximizes efficiency. Cross-selling, knowledge transfer, and shared technology platforms must become part of everyday work to provide our customers with the best possible service, «Verdu continues. Continuous coordination ensures that all teams work together – even across borders.

#### **Expansion of Road & Logistics Iberia**

Alongside strengthening international collaboration, another key focus lies in consolidating Spain as a domestic transport market. »The local market holds enormous potential, and we see significant opportunities in building our own structures,« explains Oscar Verdu. To achieve this, cooperation with the sister company L.I.T. Transport & Logistics S.L., based in Zaragoza, is being significantly intensified.

From its location at PLAZA – Europe's largest logistics platform – the company operates at the heart of Spain's economic centers. The Zaragoza office offers a wide range of services, including full and partial load transport, distribution solutions, industry-specific concepts (e.g., for wood, steel, food, and textiles), as well as specialized equipment for individual customer requirements. National and international transport is carried out both with in-house resources and through long-standing partnerships, ensuring flexibility and reliability.

The team currently consists of seven experienced professionals. Under the leadership of Javier López, the operations department with four staff members manages daily transport flows. David Zamora drives business development, focusing on

acquiring new customers and expanding existing business. Pilar Ros plays a key role in her dual function as administration and project manager, ensuring smooth processes. »Her local knowhow and operational expertise are critical to us. By consistently leveraging our strengths, we aim to offer integrated services across both branches, « emphasizes Verdu. Regular cross-training and team workshops ensure knowledge transfer and prepare the staff for handling complex, high-volume projects.

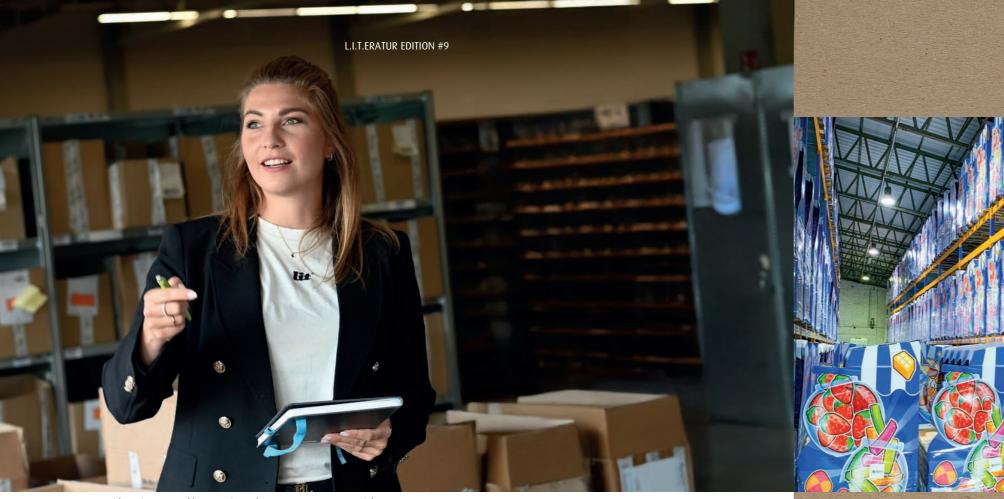
The strategic goal from autumn 2025 is clear: to provide customers with a comprehensive service portfolio that combines international reach with strong domestic execution. What started with a small team on the Iberian Peninsula is gradually evolving into a significant part of the international L.I.T. network. The combination of customer proximity, intermodal expertise, and strong personal commitment makes the Zaragoza location a true asset – for the region, the network, and the entire corporate group. Looking ahead, Verdu envisions expansion into additional Spanish regions and southern Europe, further integrating Iberia into the L.I.T. global supply chain and increasing the resilience and efficiency of international operations.

Her personal drive is not only to find solutions for existing needs but also to proactively identify and strategically leverage cross-selling opportunities, turning every customer interaction into a chance for growth. The team is supported by a new CRM system: Microsoft Dynamics, specifically tailored to the internal processes of the L.I.T. Group. By centralizing data and enabling seamless collaboration, the system strengthens the Group's ability to act swiftly on emerging needs, ensures consistency in customer engagement, and maximizes the efficiency of the cross-selling strategy.

The effectiveness of this approach is demonstrated by two impressive projects within the Group:

#### **Sweetening Success with Gummy Bears**

A striking example of the power of networking within the L.I.T. Group comes from a request by a well-known confectionery manufacturer based in Bonn: around 2,500 displays were to be filled with various gummy candies, stored, and then distributed nationwide to supermarkets.

What makes this project special is a team of three young and motivated colleagues, exemplifying how the cross-selling approach is actively lived at L.I.T.

- + Marius Leyendecker, Managing Director of PS&M Deutsche Werkslogistik GmbH, acted as the central point of contact a true embodiment of the one-face-to-the-customer principle. Together with his team, he ensured the displays were built exactly to specification, meeting the ambitious schedule.
- + Bastian Kühl, Branch Manager of L.I.T. Concepts & Services GmbH in Velbert, quickly provided the necessary production and storage space demonstrating great flexibility while operations continued.
- + Steffanie Mayer, Venture and M&A Integration Manager at L.I.T. Speditions GmbH, organized over 78 transports within three days in collaboration with the group's subsidiaries leveraging a strong internal network, precise timing, and clear communication.

»Overall, it was a demanding project involving many participants and a very challenging timeline,« says Marius Leyendecker. The result: a delighted customer and follow-up orders already in the pipeline. manufacturer were produced, stored, and delivered in record time.

#### **Cross-Selling That is Tuned for Success**

Another example perfectly illustrates the crossselling principle: a customer from the defense industry submitted an inquiry for the assembly of hearing protection devices with integrated communication functions.

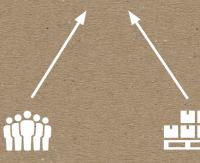
Sandra Franz, Branch Manager at L.I.T. Spedition in Bremen, immediately recognized the potential and forwarded the request to colleagues from the contract logistics division. Only a few days later, it became part of daily business: in one of L.I.T.'s northern German branches, communication headsets with hearing protection are now assembled on site. »Depending on rank and packaging level, the sets consist of various components, including hearing protection with integrated communication units, push-to-talk buttons, cables, accessories, and documentation. Each package is meticulously tailored to the customer's specifications to ensure safe storage and protection from environmental influences,« explains Daniel Schlüter, Site Manager at L.I.T. Automotive Solutions GmbH and responsible for this business area.

The subsequent transport, also handled by L.I.T. Spedition, provides the customer with a complete one-stop solution. A project that vividly demonstrates how an initially simple transport request can evolve into a complex, high-value service package through intelligent internal collaboration.

# WHEN THE FLEET GOES QUIET AND THE VALUES SPEAK LOUD

Sustainability requires commitment – and people who embody it. Since autumn 2024, Dr. Melina Knoke has been bringing fresh ideas and scientific expertise to L.I.T. as Sustainability Manager. With a background in marine environmental sciences and a PhD from Oldenburg, her goal is to connect ecological, social, and economic responsibility in a meaningful way – from electric trucks to ESG reporting. A glimpse into a future that has already begun.

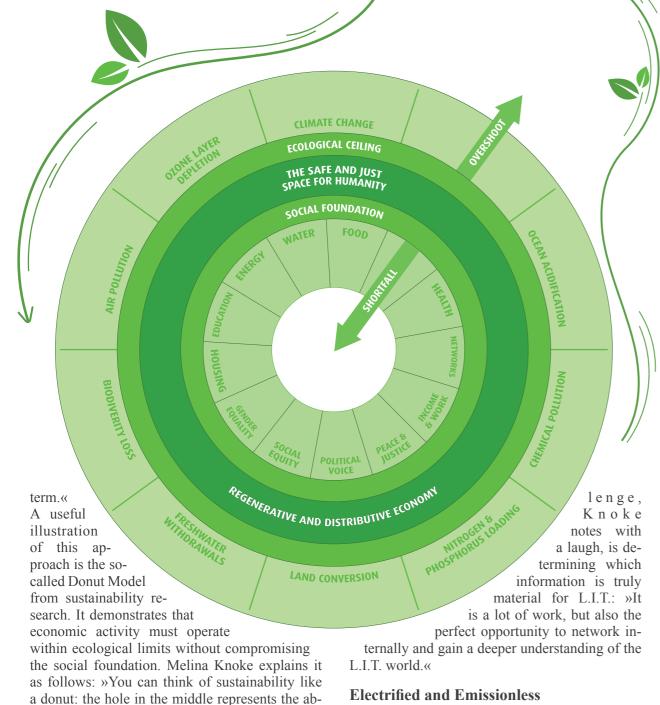
ne thing is clear: sustainability is no longer just a trend – it is a requirement, both socially and commercially. For the L.I.T. Group, it is equally clear: long-term economic success depends on acting responsibly, both environmentally and socially. This is driven not only by legal requirements, such as the reporting obligation coming into effect in 2027, but also by a growing conviction: without sustainable thinking, logistics cannot be future-proof.

#### **Knowledge Meets Impact**

Melina Knoke knows exactly what she is talking about. She is well-versed in standards, audits, certifications, and reporting obligations, and under the guidance of Quality Management Officer Heike Lettow, she supports key processes on the path toward greater sustainability. Her daily work is diverse: it ranges from contributing to strategic initiatives and coordinating internally to collecting targeted data for the upcoming sustainability report.

A crucial tool in this process is regular collaboration with colleagues across all business areas to identify where sustainable practices are already being implemented within the L.I.T. Group – and there are many.

»People often associate sustainability solely with environmental protection, which is of course a major component,« says Knoke. »But sustainable action also means being economically viable and socially responsible. In the business world, this is referred to as ESG – Environment, Social, and Governance. Only when all these aspects are aligned can a company truly be sustainable in the long



#### **Electrified and Emissionless**

Concrete examples illustrate what sustainability looks like at L.I.T. One is the deployment of electric trucks: in Lower Saxony and North Rhine-Westphalia, e-trucks are already moving across the network, for instance between Brake and Bremen. »Our eActros 300 completes four daily circuits in a two-shift operation, « explains Claas Bunjes, Head of Mobility & Digital Solutions at L.I.T. Cargo GmbH. Electric vehicles are also operating in Minden, shuttling between the new Hölkemeier subsidiary warehouse in RegioPort and a customer's storage facility.

The new East Westphalian warehouse itself is a showcase project: »Over 40,500 square meters,

divided into nine segments - featuring state-ofthe-art insulation, heat pumps, green facades, and a 4.3-megawatt photovoltaic system on the roof,« reports Lars Hölkemeier, Managing Director of Hölkemeier.

#### **Fuel from Waste**

Another strong example: some trucks in the fleet already run on HVO, a synthetic diesel derived from used cooking oils and waste materials. These alternative fuels significantly reduce lifecycle CO<sub>2</sub> emissions while maintaining operational efficiency. L.I.T. is also exploring hybrid solutions and hydrogen-powered vehicles for future fleet expansion, signaling a long-term commitment to low-emission transport. Detailed insights into alternative drives and cutting-edge technology are available in the dedicated feature on page 40.

#### Sustainability as a Mindset

At L.I.T., sustainability goes beyond technology and transport. Social responsibility is equally important. Fair pay, equal opportunities, and employee development are integral parts of the corporate culture. Melina Knoke is particularly passionate about promoting women in this traditionally male-dominated industry: »This is a key lever for greater equity – and also for bringing fresh perspectives into the company.«

In addition, numerous small and large initiatives are already making a difference: job bike leasing, health programs within occupational health management, and joint sports events like company runs not only strengthen employees but also foster social cohesion.

All these activities keep Melina Knoke's daily sustainability agenda in motion. For her, sustainability is not a project but a responsibility. She is confident: »At L.I.T., we are on the right path because many colleagues are already thinking and acting sustainably – even if they do not always realize it.«

### TURNING GREEN IDEAS INTO DAILY PRACTICE

In day-to-day business, discussions often focus on the big picture: technologies, market demands, regulatory requirements. But what does sustainability look like in practice? In people's minds, on the road, and in our own decisions? We spoke with three colleagues who are involved in this topic in very different ways: Dr. Melina Knoke, Sustainability and Environmental Management; Claas Bunjes, Head of Mobility & Digital Solutions; and Ralf Biere, Automotive Project Management. A conversation about corporate responsibility, practical implementation, and the steps that still lie ahead.

elina, what does sustainability mean to you personally, and why is it such a central topic for us as a logistics service provider?

MELINA KNOKE For me, sustainability means taking responsibility. This applies to our environment, our customers, and also to future generations. In logistics, the CO<sub>2</sub> footprint is significant. That is why we have a particular responsibility to take action. It is not just about implementing individual measures. We must systematically question how we can make our services more sustainable – economically, socially, and environmentally – while ensuring that solutions remain practical and can be directly applied in daily operations.

Claas, you are responsible for technology. What role do sustainable drive technologies play in your daily work?

**CLAAS BUNJES** Sustainability is no longer just a buzzword for us. It is our daily challenge – and of-

ten quite a balancing act. Over the past two decades, there have been many technological approaches and innovations, some of which have not proven effective in daily operations or were withdrawn due to political decisions. These included LPG (liquefied petroleum gas), LNG (liquefied natural gas), HVO (hydrogenated vegetable oil), as well as electric and hydrogen drives. Some approaches have retrospectively shown potential for improvement. What we have learned is that you do not always have to be the »first mover« — It is about actively monitoring the market and choosing the right moment to drive and shape the transformation of the transport sector.

#### What setbacks have you experienced?

BUNJES I remember one night when an entire justin-time line went down due to clogged rapeseed oil filters. Naturally, we had to work under high pressure to find a solution. That is why we always have to evaluate technology and operations in context. Every system we implement must withstand the realities of daily logistics.

Claas Bunjes, Dr. Melina Knoke, and Ralf Biere (from left to right) work closely together to implement sustainability directly in day-to-day Ralf, vou are operationally close to the action. How does L.I.T. approach sustainability in everyday customer interactions? **RALF BIERE** Our customers are much further ahead today than they were five years ago. Especially in industries like beverages or automotive, sustainability is already standard. Many conduct regular audits or want to know exactly how their transports reduce CO<sub>2</sub>. This also changes our work. It is no longer enough to say we operate green. Customers expect numbers, certifications, and tangible proof. And That is a good thing. Are there also examples of how sustainability works in day-to-day operations? BIERE Absolutely. When we plan routes today, we consider in much more detail which vehicles to deploy. Can we switch to fully electric vehicles, for in-

stance? Is there sufficient charging infrastructure along

the route? Can we utilize charging opportunities at loading

and unloading points to make the most of our time on site? These questions are directly integrated into our planning.

We have also found that our drivers show great interest in innovative technology when they are actively involved in operational planning. Motivated drivers have become a key factor in the quality and efficiency of our services. Embedding sustainability in this way ensures that environmental considerations are not just theoretical, but part of the operational heartbeat of our logistics network.

#### You just mentioned the different fuels. HVO, for example, is made from waste. What is your stance on it?

**BUNJES** From a technical perspective, HVO 100 is a good and fast transitional solution. The fuel can be used one-to-one like diesel, without vehicle conversion. However, there are pitfalls: It is crucial that the HVO is sustainably certified. This means it must not be derived from palm oil, but genuinely from waste and residual materials, such as from the food industry. These certifications must be fully traceable.

**KNOKE** HVO has only been approved as a pure fuel in Germany since 2024. This means the entire process, from sourcing certified quantities to practical use, is still being established. We initially had to learn how to procure and deploy fully verifiable, truly sustainable volumes. That is why we are currently

working on systematically offering our customers the so-called Book-and-Claim procedure. Here, HVO is used in our own fleet, but not necessarily on the same route we transport for the customer. Nevertheless, the CO<sub>2</sub> savings can be accounted to the customer. Even if there is no HVO fueling station on site. In this way, we can work together with our customers to decarbonize the transport sector.

#### And what about the electric trucks? Where do we stand today?

BIERE We currently have several projects underway. For one, a demanding just-in-sequence delivery in Bremen has been partially shifted to battery-powered vehicles. Bumpers need to be delivered to the production site within just a few hours. This is not only logistically complex but also technically highly challenging. We are using a fully electric lowliner tractor unit, which had to be optimized initially as part of a pilot project. After a successful test run in summer 2024, the e-truck has been operating daily on the Brake–Bremen route since February 2025. Despite higher energy consumption in winter, the deployment runs stably with four rounds per day. This proves that it works – if you plan it correctly.

#### And how do the drivers perceive it?

BUNJES Surprisingly positive. The two regular drivers (both experienced diesel drivers) of our first e-truck did not want to switch back to diesel after only a short time. The quiet driving, combined with the smooth operation and immediate acceleration, is very well received. Of course, there is more effort involved with connecting and disconnecting at the charging station, which requires careful coordination. But the comfort and driving experience remain convincing. Moreover, the drivers clearly notice that we, as a company, are fully committed, which provides additional motivation.

#### How important is charging infrastructure for your progress?

BUNJES Extremely important. Without infrastructure, there is no progress. At our headquarters in Brake, we are fortunate to have a charging station nearby. For our own charging points, however, we are working intensively on solutions — only in this way can e-trucks be deployed reliably and continuously. Charging infrastructure is not just a technical matter for us, but an essential and central component of our overall mobility strategy, supporting both operational planning and future expansion.



The combination of careful planning and strong operational expertise ensures that L.I.T. is well prepared for the challenges ahead.

#### How does all this fit into L.I.T. Group's overall corporate strategy?

**KNOKE** Sustainability has now become an integral part of our long-term strategic direction. This includes significant investments in new technologies and infrastructure – a major challenge for any company, both financially and organizationally, especially when charging facilities are needed across multiple sites. We now think in terms of transport networks: from CO<sub>2</sub>-neutral warehouses equipped with photovoltaic systems and charging infrastructure at locations such as Minden, to well-designed intermodal concepts that combine road, rail, and sea transport. Equally important to us is ensuring that every step remains measurable and verifiable – because only then can progress truly be sustained.

#### How realistic is it that conventional diesel will be phased out by 2035?

BUNJES The current political discussions show just how dynamic the industry is right now. From a technical standpoint, however, we are not yet at a stage where one propulsion technology clearly stands out. What we need is openness to all technologies – and we have to be honest: without incentives, such as toll exemptions or subsidies, the transition remains a major economic challenge for many companies. The right path forward will likely be a balanced mix that includes battery-electric, hydrogen, HVO,

and perhaps even diesel for certain applications. At the same time, we are closely monitoring developments in both the market and regulation. Our goal remains clear – to reduce emissions step by step while maintaining the flexibility needed to adapt as technologies and frameworks evolve.

#### And where do you see our company in ten or fifteen years?

**KNOKE** In ten years, we may not have fully reached our goal yet, but we will have made significant progress. We are working toward making our company CO<sub>2</sub>-neutral. Regardless of political debates, our industry transitions. Sustainability is already a core part of our strategy – both out of responsibility and as a competitive advantage. Demand is rising, and today we are laying the groundwork for the future.

**BIERE** I see our strength in being close to operations. We know what is needed out on the road, and we have the people who will drive this transformation forward. If we maintain this spirit, we will remain strong in fifteen years, offering a wide range of solutions for very different requirements.

**BUNJES** I see us well-positioned. We started early, experimented extensively, and learned from setbacks. If we continue on this path, by 2035 we will be a reliable, modern, and sustainable logistics partner – both for our customers and employees.



Amid fully automated high-bay warehouses, autonomously moving forklifts, and precisely controlled refrigerated transports, a complex logistical clockwork ticks to the minute every day in Minden. Here, in the heart of East Westphalia, the L.I.T. Group, through its subsidiary Hölkemeier Spedition GmbH and the affiliated companies ESM Ertl Systemlogistik Minden GmbH & Co. KG and Karl Möller Internationale Speditions-GmbH & Co. KG, demonstrates how modern consumer goods logistics works – seamlessly interconnected, proactively managed, and with full responsibility for both people and goods.

ince January 2024, ESM has been part of the Hölkemeier family, fully integrated into the strong network of the L.I.T. Group. With its Minden site, ESM specializes in the logistics of particularly sensitive consumer goods. Whether pet food, chocolate, chewing gum, or other food items, the demands on storage and transport are high – manufacturers' quality standards must be met with absolute precision.

Our site is prepared for this diversity,« says Andreas Voigt, Managing Director of ESM Ertl Systemlogistik Minden GmbH & Co. KG. »With our automated processes and state-of-the-art warehouse technologies, we are able to respond quickly to seasonal peaks and handle different product categories with precision.

Currently, the spacious facilities store more than 46,000 pallets of pet and indulgence products from an international brand portfolio, 19,000 pallets of seasonally influenced confectionery, and around 27,000 pallets of pet food from a manufacturer whose plant is advantageously located directly opposite. Daily, several thousand pallets of these items are moved in and out, tailored precisely to the requirements of each product group.

#### **Technology Meets Precision**

The ESM warehouse is a prime example of modern intralogistics: automated high-bay storage, autonomous narrow-aisle systems, drive-in satellite storage, and conveyor technology, all supported by skilled professionals. Despite the high level of automation, people remain at the center: responsibility and expertise are crucial when handling sensitive consumer goods. More than 130 employees work daily in the approximately 41,500-squaremeter facility, which has already been expanded twice

Particularly impressive is the direct connection to the neighboring pet food manufacturer via a fully automated bridge. »This link allows us to achieve just-in-time disposal from production in a way that is unparalleled, « says Voigt. Finished goods thus reach storage without any intermediate stops — a prime example of efficient and sustainable site logistics

#### When It Needs to Stay Cold

For temperature-sensitive transports, Karl Möller Internationale Speditions- GmbH & Co. KG operates around 50 trucks, regularly serving ESM.

Their vehicles are designed for highly specialized refrigerated transport: double-deck systems allow for 33 to 66 pallets per trip, and temperatures can be flexibly controlled from -40 °C to +40 °C. »Especially for strongly odorous or taste-sensitive products, strict rules apply,« explains Jonas Wulf, Managing Director of Karl Möller Spedition. »No other food products may be loaded when certain items are on board.« Möller carries out around 20 collections per day on behalf of ESM – currently focusing on the Ruhr area, with plans to expand nationwide to the retail food sector in the medium term

#### **More Than Warehouses and Trucks**

The consumer goods logistics of the L.I.T. Group has been strengthened by the acquisitions of ESM Systemlogistik and Möller Spedition, adding two strong partners to the portfolio. As the parent company, L.I.T. Group, together with Hölkemeier, was not venturing into unknown territory. Hölkemeier operates a bonded warehouse in the Minden industrial port, where, in addition to coffee from a renowned Hamburg roastery, non-food consumer

goods from the same company are stored, packaged, and transported. For transport services, Hölkemeier is also supported by L.I.T. Speditions GmbH, demonstrating how closely the companies are networked and how operational synergies are leveraged across the group.

Furthermore, Hölkemeier and ESM Systemlogistik offer a wide range of value-added services, including display construction for promotional items, tailored packaging solutions, and logistics consulting, for example for major confectionery and pet food brands.

»Our goal is to offer the entire logistics chain comprehensively, including temperature-controlled transports, different storage systems and requirements, and additional services such as customs handling or display construction for the point of sale. At our Minden site, we are now able to represent this very effectively, « says Lars Hölkemeier, Managing Director of Hölkemeier Spedition.

ves as the primary tenant, ensuring seamless continuity of operations.

»We store items there such as snacks, chewing gum, and peanuts – the latter will even be delivered directly by ship via the Mittelland Canal in the future,« says Lars Hölkemeier, highlighting the advantages of the site's intermodal capabilities, which connect the canal and rail lines alongside traditional truck traffic. The climate-controlled area covers approximately 22,000 square meters, while Hölkemeier Spedition uses the remaining 18,000 square meters for the storage of products from a globally leading sanitary manufacturer, enabling flexible allocation of space according to seasonal demand.

Between climate-controlled storage halls, fully automated transfer bridges, and individually temperature-controlled trucks, ESM Systemlogistik and Hölkemeier demonstrate that consumer goods logistics is no longer just about pallets and storage space. It is a precise orchestration of technology, people, and strategy, where every detail from timing to handling protocols is optimized for efficiency and quality.

Speditions GmbH in 2024, it was one of those moments. »Of course, this means a great deal to us, « says Managing Director Dirk Schröder. »Above all, it is a recognition of our employees. They are the reason for this success. « A business year that demonstrated: with team spirit and a clear focus, much can be achieved – even in turbulent times.

estfalia Intralog offers well-thought-out logistics solutions with foresight. The jumbo swap bodies, featuring liftable roofs, double-sided loading, secure transport fastening, and the option to be used as mobile warehouses, stand for maximum flexibility and efficiency.

The 2025 business year brings challenges and requires decisive action: »Some business areas have collapsed, leading to volume declines,« reports Managing Director Dirk Schröder. Particularly in the automotive sector, capacities are currently underutilized. »Of course, that makes you think, but we are working together to find solutions.«

Sales Director and authorized officer Lars Weisbrich adds: »We do not wait; we act.« The focus lies on vehicle costs, scheduling, and tariff adjustments. Even difficult decisions, such as ending unprofitable customer relationships, are not ruled out. The goal is to remain capable of action, adapt to market changes swiftly, and continue providing reliable service to existing clients while seeking new opportunities.

#### Down-to-Earth, Honest, Direct

Despite successes, Westfalia maintains its East Westphalian modesty. »That is just who we are – grounded and family-oriented,« says Schröder. Westfalia particularly benefits from the L.I.T. Group network, to which the Herford-based company has belonged since 2021. 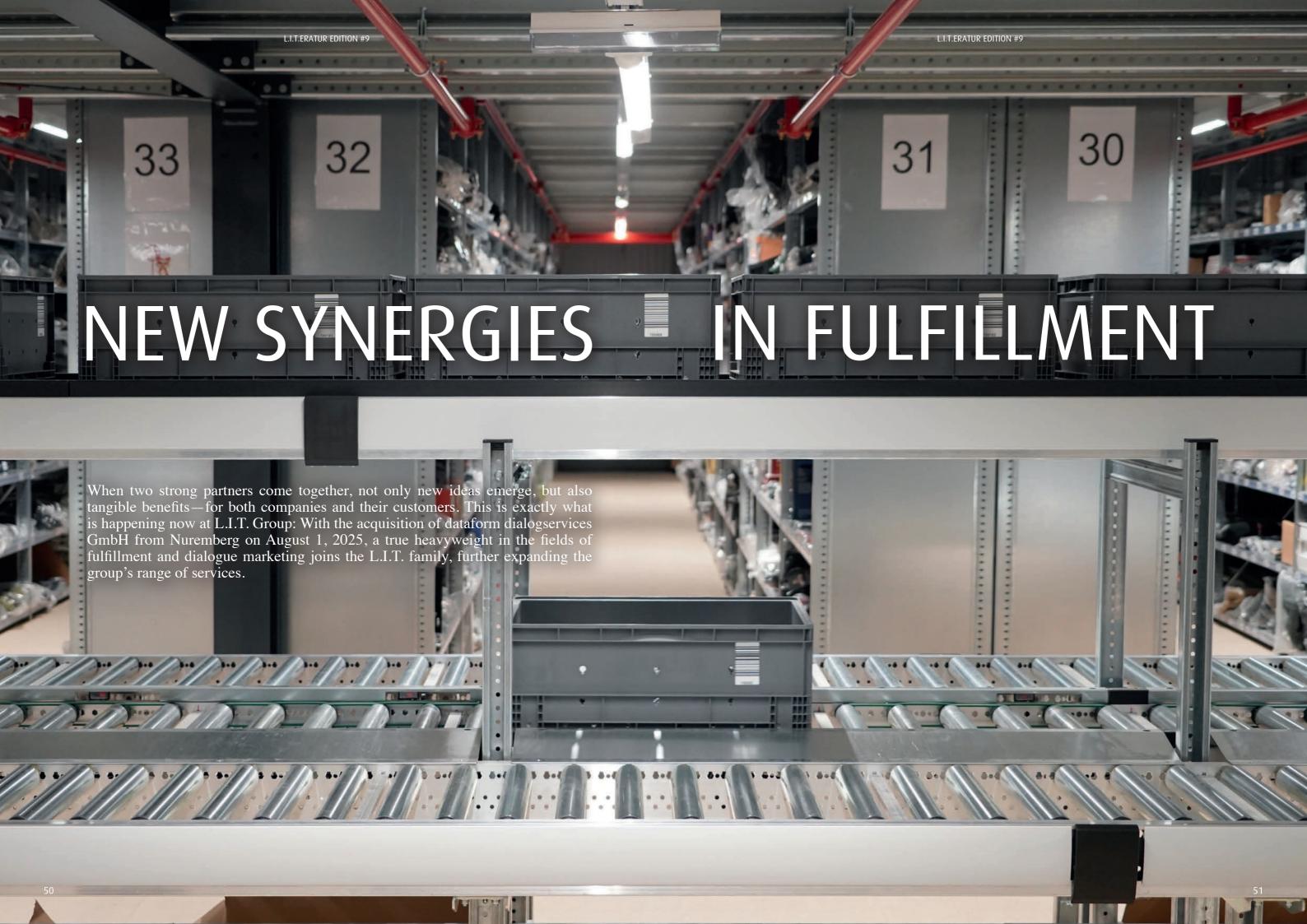

e do not see quality as a final inspection, but as a continuous process,« says Frank Deiters. »When we sort parts, analyze data, or adjust processes, it is never just about finding errors. It is about creating structures that ensure quality sustainably.«

REWOTEC Engineering GmbH has locations across Germany and Europe, from Emden to Wolfsburg and even the Czech Republic. Proximity to the production sites is an integral part of the concept. »Our customers expect answers within hours, not days. That is why we have established decentralized structures and qualified personnel directly on-site, « explains Deiters. This approach also allows the company to respond flexibly to unexpected challenges, such as sudden changes in production schedules or urgent customer requests, ensuring that quality and delivery timelines are never compromised.

The range of services spans from sorting and rework to resident engineering, process optimization, and start-up management. A special feature is the in-house developed quality management system (QMS) »QUEST«, which captures all data relevant to proper order processing – from quality metrics and working hours to personnel management and graphical analyses – making trends visible. »Only those who can measure their quality can control it. QUEST provides exactly the information we need to react precisely and quickly.«

Teams are trained and certified according to international standards. Methods such as APQP, PPAP, 8D, and FMEA are part of everyday practice. Deiters emphasizes that standards are not only formally met but practically applied. »Our employees must not only know what a standard says, but understand why it is important. Only then does real value emerge.«

Even in administrative processes, REWOTEC Engineering GmbH prioritizes efficiency. AI systems assist with reporting, deployment planning, and communication. For Frank Deiters, this is not an end in itself: »Digitalization does not mean replacing people. It helps us find relevant information faster, allowing us to spend more time on what really matters: working on quality.«

o unlock this potential, the company has now appointed two junior managers to key positions. Robin Landgraf takes over the Multimodal International division, while Max Österreicher heads the Intermodal Dedicated division, focusing on SmartRail Logistics GmbH. Both bring different strengths to the table but pursue the same goal: advancing multimodality at L.I.T. to the next level.

#### Robin Landgraf: Globally Connected

Robin Landgraf is well-acquainted with the complexities of cross-border transport. He began his career as a dispatcher and project manager and quickly distinguished himself through responsibility, market knowledge, and reliability. In projects such as the development of the SmartRail route Heilbronn-Osnabrück, he demonstrated how multimodal processes can be coordinated efficiently and how potential bottlenecks can be anticipated and resolved before they impact operations.

These include building a European transport network for all plants of a German automotive manufacturer, as well as supplying distribution warehouses of a German retail company with weekly changing promotional products.

His next step is ambitious. Starting in 2026, he plans to establish open multi-client train systems,

allowing multiple customers to share a single train service. This approach not only makes transportation more cost-effective but also more sustainable. »Max has a keen sense of how to translate complex requirements into viable solutions, « says Klaas Lange. »This is precisely the skill we need to further develop our multimodal operations.«

#### **Multimodality as a Growth Driver**

Multimodal transport is far more than the logical combination of truck, rail, and ship. It creates flexibility, connects new locations, and provides alternatives when traditional supply chains are under pressure. For L.I.T., strengthening this segment is therefore a strategic move to offer customers sustainable and competitive solutions in the long term.

With Landgraf and Österreicher at the helm, the group aims to expand this area consistently, guided by a shared goal and mission: multimodality is to become one of L.I.T.'s most important fields for the future. Their combined approach ensures that the group can scale operations efficiently while maintaining high service quality and environmental responsibility.

### FROM FJORDS TO FORKS

When it comes to transporting fresh fish across a continent, there is no room for error. One degree too warm, one hour too late, and the product loses its value. For UAB L.I.T. Thermo, the Lithuanian branch of the L.I.T. Group, the mission is clear: Feeding Europe: one perfectly cooled trailer at a time. Headquartered in Vilnius and led by Managing Director Mykolas Subačius, the company has established itself as a reliable specialist in temperature-controlled logistics, combining precise planning, state-of-the-art refrigeration technology, and highly trained staff.

hether it is fresh salmon from Norway, delicate fruit from Southern Europe, or frozen goods requiring precise handling, UAB L.I.T. Thermo ensures that every delivery arrives in top condition. Their 11-person team operates with military precision, offering 24/7 tracking, customer support, and logistics consultation tailored to individual needs.

#### A Journey to the Edge of Europe

One of the company's proudest milestones took place in August 2025, marking the northernmost transport in L.I.T. history. From Hamburg to Tromsø – 2,375 kilometers in six days – a truck loaded with cruise ship supplies ventured deep into the Arctic Circle. While the cargo was non-temperature-sensitive, the route itself demanded exceptional coordination, reliability, and resilience from both drivers and dispatch.

Not long after, the team took on its longest journey yet: a 3,943-kilometer sprint from Rypefjord, Norway, to Calderara di Reno, Italy, in just four days. The cargo? Fresh salmon. The challenge? Keeping it pristine across a multi-national route with strict temperature control requirements. From the Arctic coastline to the sunny plains of northern Italy, every stop, seal, and temperature reading had to be documented flawlessly. "This trip symbolized exactly what we stand for, "says Subačius." Efficiency, quality, and precision, all under pressure."

#### The Science Behind Cool

Transporting perishable goods is not just about setting the right temperature. »You need deep knowledge,« explains Subačius. »It is not just apples and oranges. Literally.« For example, apples emit ethylene, which accelerates the ripening of other

fruits and vegetables. A costly mistake if stored together. Cucumbers and tomatoes? Not compatible either. Every product has its own characteristics, and only precise handling ensures that freshness and quality remain intact all the way to the customer.

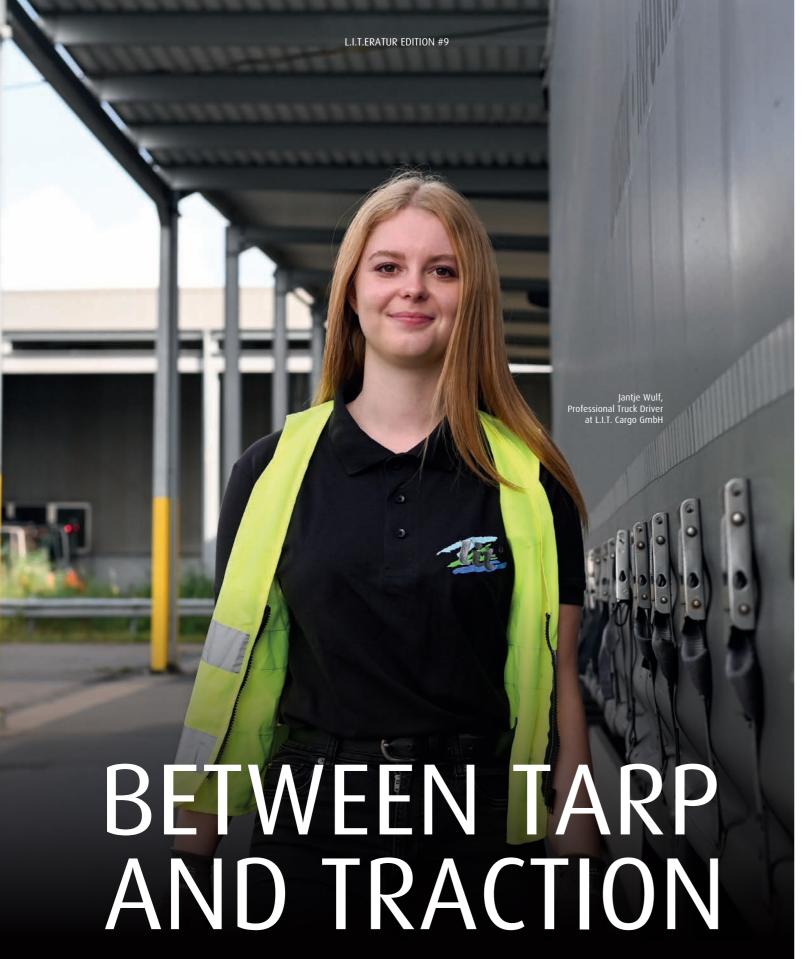
Even more crucial is understanding that refrigerated trailers are not industrial freezers. »They maintain, but do not chill, «Subačius notes. »That is why temperature checks during loading are vital. If you load warm, you risk losing the cargo. «Add to this the need for route optimization, security measures for high-value goods, and compliance with countless regulations across borders and you begin to see the expertise required to succeed in this niche.

#### **Driven by People**

Behind each successful delivery is the strength of the L.I.T. UAB Thermo team. »We are small but highly effective,« says Subačius proudly. Among the fleet are four female drivers, a notable figure in the still male-dominated world of logistics. »It is about skill, not stereotypes,« he adds.

As the company eyes expansion, the focus remains on growing the fleet, winning new clients, and securing a top spot within the L.I.T. Group's portfolio. The ambition is not only to move goods but to set new standards in how temperature-sensitive logistics are done, combining operational excellence with innovative solutions.

And so, from icy fjords in Norway to sun-soaked towns in Italy, from fresh salmon to frozen vegetables, UAB L.I.T. Thermo delivers freshness. Kilometre by kilometre, degree by degree, with every step monitored and optimized. Because in the end, whether it is fish or fruit, freshness does not travel itself – it travels with skill, care, and expertise.

# »I'm in the driver's seat– literally.«

Jantje Wulf on the freedom and responsibility she experiences in her daily work.

rake, 10:15 a.m. A dull clack echoes across the L.I.T. Cargo GmbH yard in Brake as Jantje Wulf opens the door to her truck. After a rainy night, the roads are still wet, and the air is fresh. A light breeze gently blows while the sun slowly breaks through the clouds — a cool, slightly humid summer morning in northern Germany. Jantje Wulf carefully pulls on her gloves and checks the tarpaulin of the trailer. Today's task: delivering bumpers for a major German automobile manufacturer from Rehau in Brake to Bremen.

»Opening the tarp is sometimes really a test of strength, « Jantje says, bracing her whole body firmly against the frame. Her hands slip briefly, and a sudden jolt runs through her body. »Especially as a woman, you notice that the job is physically demanding. « Yet she remains calm, almost routine. »If it does not work, there is usually someone nearby to help – for example with a little trick that only experienced truckers know. «

#### Silicone Spray vs. Muscle Power

Jantje grins and pulls a small spray can from the side compartment. »It just makes things slide better. For example, at the air connections,« she explains, tilting the can slightly to get just the right amount. She means the connection between the truck and trailer – a spot that has challenged even seasoned drivers, especially on damp or cold mornings when everything feels a bit stiff.

The tarp is now open, the trailer ready. On Rehau's factory grounds, a forklift is already waiting. Nine lifts, thirty-six bumpers – carefully stored and secured. Jantje then disappears briefly into the

office building, returning shortly with a stack of shipping documents. »It has the borderon number on it,« she explains, quickly entering the eight-digit sequence into her tablet. The »Truck« app displays her route for the day. A QR code appears. »I'll need this later at the Bremen gate. Without it, I won't get in.«

Alongside the digital workflow, there is still some paperwork: a handwritten note from the L.I.T. office with license plates, freight details, and recipient info for the local colleagues. »It will also be scanned there again,« she says almost casually, tapping the clipboard against her leg, as she climbs into the cab, balancing quickly on the step.

#### Music on, world off.

Sixty-six kilometers lie ahead along the B212 toward Bremen. The morning sun shines, and Miley Cyrus blares from the speakers. »I can buy myself flowers,« the song goes. Jantje turns the volume up slightly, her fingers tapping along on the steering wheel. Somehow, the lyrics perfectly suit the confident twenty-year-old, navigating life – and the road – independently.

It is this mix of freedom and responsibility that Jantje loves about her job. Alone at the wheel of a ton-heavy vehicle, she feels both empowered and accountable. »I'm in the driver's seat — literally, « she says.

Her path here was actually unplanned. At a vocational fair, she had intended to explore a commercial apprenticeship. »And then suddenly I was sitting in the cab of the L.I.T. trainee truck.« Sparks flew. Her parents? Initially surprised. »But they supported me immediately.«

#### Highlight at Walking Speed

In the rearview mirror, the last houses of Brake disappear. During the drive, Jantje shares a special experience: »Right after getting my driver's license, I was allowed to drive the truck in the Kramermarkt parade in Oldenburg. At walking speed through the entire crowd.« A friend was allowed to accompany her. »It was amazing! A real recognition.«

The Kramermarkt parade is part of a traditional folk festival in Oldenburg – similar to Oktoberfest, of course much smaller and regional. Multiple clubs, companies, and showmen parade through the city center with brightly decorated wagons. For many, it is a highlight of the fall season – for Jantje, a milestone in her professional journey.

#### Bremen, Arrival.

At the gate of the major German automotive manufacturer, Jantje holds her tablet up to the scanner. It beeps, the barrier lifts, and she carefully maneuvers the truck through the entrance. A few minutes later, she stands next to the trailer, releases the tarpaulin fasteners, and then the bottom ratchet straps, which are particularly tight and stubborn. She then pulls the tarp back, folding it neatly and giving the forklifts enough room to operate efficiently.

»Now to pump the roof up,« she mutters, focusing. At the front and back, she grabs the crank and raises the roof steadily. In the middle, it sags slightly, so Jantje reaches for the runge, a long metal rod, and props the roof firmly in place. Carefully, she unloads the fully packed truck with her forklift, placing the packaged bumpers onto the production line. Each piece finds its

designated spot, and the precision of the operation leaves no room for mistakes.

Jantje takes a deep breath – the most stressful part is done. Her truck is now empty and ready for the return trip. Empty racks head back to Brake. Another round awaits. »But that doesn't bother me. I love being on the road.« With a smile, she looks over the yard before climbing back into her cab. A new song starts playing. The next stretch of the road belongs entirely to her.

In logistics, they find both: an industry that is growing through digitalization, international goods flows, and new customer demands, offering a wide variety of tasks. For the L.I.T. Group, this means not only providing apprentices with an entry point, but also giving them a long-term perspective.

urrently, around 130 apprentices are starting their careers at L.I.T., with approximately 40 more joining each year. To provide guidance, the apprenticeship department relies on clear structures and comparable standards across all locations. Digital tools such as the Apprenticeship Navigator create transparency, while introductory days and training weeks facilitate the start. Supraregional formats like »Best Apprentice«, trade fair appearances in Bremen, or a day at a globally renowned automobile manufacturer provide insights that go beyond the apprentice's own location and encourage networking across sites.

»We place great importance on ensuring that apprenticeships are understood consistently throughout the group. Young people need guardrails they can orient themselves by,« says Nele Grenzebach, who, together with Melanie Kalla, shapes the apprenticeship program. Kalla adds: »Direct contact is crucial. In conversations and training sessions, we immediately see what works well and where adjustments are needed.«

Nils Schönknecht, an aspiring freight forwarding clerk from Moers, has already experienced this approach: right at the start, he met colleagues from other regions and subsidiaries during the introductory week. Later, he worked in a team with apprentices from multiple locations for the »Best Apprentice« competition. Such experiences demonstrate that apprenticeships at L.I.T. are not conducted in isolation but primarily through exchange across companies and hierarchies.

With the restructuring of the department, the phase after completing the apprenticeship is now also coming into focus. In an industry with high demand for skilled workers, L.I.T. aims to develop and retain its own talent early on. Some further training programs are already running, and additional measures are being prepared. The goal is to provide clear development paths and build a pool of young talent that will support the company in the long term.

A central role is played by the trainee program, which is currently being further developed. It is designed to both support the business units in their

daily work and build competencies in projects and leadership. It targets both high-performing apprentices who are being retained and external graduates starting their careers at L.I.T. Through rotations and cross-departmental assignments, apprentices gain a holistic understanding of the company and its operations.

Julian Derst, Head of Apprenticeship and Training, says: »With our decades of experience in apprenticeship programs, we have an excellent foundation to build on. Our current focus is to better connect apprenticeships and further training. Our aim is to provide young people with guidance from the very beginning and to show them clear paths even after completing their apprenticeship. « For the company's management, this course sends a clear signal. Simeon Breuer, Board Member of the L.I.T. Group, emphasizes: »We fundamentally

see L.I.T. as a platform – both for entrepreneurs within the company and for career development, meaning apprenticeships and further training. We are now linking these programs together to open up opportunities for young people, to allow them to discover their potential early, and to create pathways for long-term professional growth. This provides security and planning reliability, both values that are becoming increasingly important today. At the same time, we strengthen our position as a top employer in a dynamic market.«

For Nils and his fellow apprentices, the bottom line is clear: they always know where they stand, where they can develop in the future, and that at L.I.T. they are receiving a hands-on apprenticeship while gradually growing into a professional future with real prospects, supported by mentoring, peer learning, and continuous feedback.

## ALL ACCOUNTS ARE SETTLED!

At the break of dawn, when the first invoices are issued, the accounting department is already deep in the day's operations. Under the leadership of Izabela Stefaniak, a team of ten employees and one apprentice works from the Brake and Bremen locations for the entire L.I.T. Group. Driven by experience, team spirit, and an open approach to digital developments, the department ensures that processes run smoothly today and remain reliable in the future.

ur workday starts early because accounting is one of the company's central processes. »We make sure that invoices and credit notes are sent out on time,« says Izabela Stefaniak. In addition, the team handles handovers to the finance department, processes complaints, and checks freight documents, which are then submitted to the payer.

Part of the work is carried out using the credit note procedure, which requires particularly careful preparation. »In order to issue invoices, the freight documents must be complete – without them, nothing works, « explains Stefaniak. This also includes reviewing, sorting, and digitizing documents from the fleet or external contractors.

Each employee has a focus area but simultaneously supports several companies within the group. »That is quite demanding. You have to keep your own processes under control while also being flexible enough to work in other areas, « Stefaniak notes. The variety keeps the work interesting and encourages cross-training, which ensures that the department remains resilient in peak periods.

The accounting department is closely connected with other areas, especially finance. Colleagues coordinate payment information and handovers there, and approvals and complaints must be re-

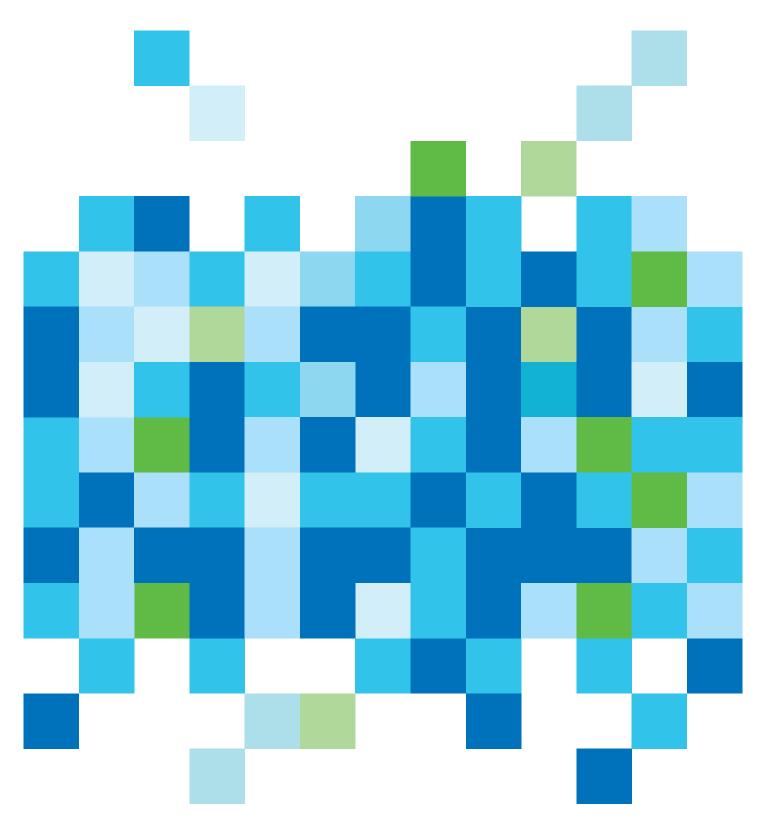
solved quickly. »Sometimes we feel almost like detectives when a document is missing or a figure does not match. You need a lot of patience and sometimes a bit of humor, « Stefaniak says with a small smile.

As the department head, the team spirit is particularly important to her: »Everyone takes responsibility here. The commitment and reliability of each individual make our department strong. Women power is not just a slogan for us, we actually live it every day.«

Even though the work requires a lot of routine, Stefaniak sees the department well-prepared for future changes. »Digitalization and automation will certainly change many things in the coming years. What matters is that we remain open to this while continuing to deliver the quality the group relies on.«

Accounting remains a department that usually works in the background but is indispensable for the success of the entire group. Julian Lachnitt, Board Member of the L.I.T. Group, emphasizes this: »When invoices are issued, complaints processed, or freight documents checked, it may look routine. In fact, it involves a lot of detailed work and coordination with other departments. This reliability ensures that processes across the group run smoothly. My thanks go to Izabela and the entire team who ensure this day after day.«
